## HAPPY HOLIDAYS




All I needed to know...

As the rush of the holiday season approaches, let us all be cherry and thankful like a chickadee.






## “Cardinal Candy”

# THEY'RE BACK!

## Our Beloved Goldfinch!

Here they are now! Drab dark yellow-gold, males with nearly no black cap. They now blend more with their winter surroundings. Many think the goldfinch are migratory but they are not! They are seed eaters that stay year-round and make this their home. Goldfinch nest very late in summer when thistle and many other native plants have gone to seed. They move out into the wild areas and we think they've gone from us for winter. Not so. They are not like Cardinals who spend most of their time in one neighborhood, where they eat, sleep, and nest. Goldfinch are somewhat "nomadic", moving from house to house, staying a few days thrilling us with their tiny little chirp, but almost always in a group.

Now in their winter drab attire, (junco to the bottom right). Forget feeding nyjer thistle, instead feed straight fine sunflower chips in a feeder made of steel mesh, and you'll have as many finch as the feeder can hold. It's a true winner!
